All of this good feeling culminates on Christmas Day when everyone gathers around the tree for the traditional trading of gifts. As the gifts are beened we see folks with hobbies such as woodworking getting things like saws and hammers, videophiles get movies on video tape, stamp collectors get stamps and what about us ADAM hobbyists? I think if those that are stuck with the task of buying us gifts were able to just stroll down to the local software bistro and leaf through ADAM software on the shelf, we'd probably be seeing more as gifts. Unfortunately as all ADAM owners know, for most of us, ADAM software can only be purchased through the mail. However, I think I may have found the solution!

Try this. Take all of your favorite ADAM catalogs down to the local drug store or any place there is a copy machine and make two N copies of each order form. I'll explain why you need two in a moment. Bring them home and fill out each one, entirely, for different L pieces of software that you'd like to receive as a gift. (The reason you fill out two is once the package does arrive you still won't know exactly what you've gotten until the day you rip off the wrapping paper!) Now take the completed forms and hand them to your loved one and say something like, "you've been so busy lately that I was concerned about your spending time having to look for a gift so I thought I'd make it easy for you!" Naturally this outpouring of concern can only be rewarded in one way, SOFTWARE! This can also work for birthdays!

Well, it's Thanksgiving Day and what are I doing? (Besides waiting for dinner!) ... Diligently writing the latest BIOS CALL... only after being shooed from the kitchen for taste-testing.

Since you last heard from me I have: gotten engaged, lost my job, started school, found a new job, missed ADAMCON1, TREKON 11, and had my car broken into... so please excuse the tardiness and absence of myself and my column. In light of all this, I promised Pat that at the VERY next MOAUG meeting I would have at least the next three articles for the newsletter prepared. Well, the meeting has come and gone, and due to further difficulties neither I nor my articles were there.

In addition, I've moved, and have yet to locate my back issues of the newsletter, thus I'm not real sure of where I am on the starter pack. So here goes...

In light of good packing and poor memory I think I will pick a rather safe subject this month. One that doesn't relate to the other articles but will allow you a little more versatility with

In an alphabetical directory of the STARTER PAK you'll find that the 4th entry is unusual in that its name doesn't give you any hint as to what its CP/M function could be. Well, there's a very good reason for that. CATPRTVI.4Z isn't a CP/M file. It's an EDS file that I think is so great that I think everyone should have it. I found this file on the old TARDIS BBS about four years ago and that was the first and last time that I have seen it. Therefore I must assume that this is an as yet undiscovered need.

So come with me on this day of discovery and let's have some fun!!!

As it sits, the file will do you absolutely no good at all. So, to start with, you'll need to format and sysgem another CP/M disk (or datapack) that you can use as a work disk. On your work disk, you will need to copy several files. The files you will need are: CATPRIVI.4Z, UNCR2O.COM, and CPMADAM.COM (from your original CP/M tape.)

If you have two data drives, or one data and one disk drive, or any other combination of media sources, then this copying should be quite easy. If, on the other hand, you have the basic ADAM only one tape drive, then you are in a bit of a bind. (Fear h.... This is a bind that we'll get you out of in just a few lines here.) For a multidrive unit you can use the built-in COPY command on your STARTER PAK. Use the command:

(This is assuming that your STARTER PAK is in drive A: and your work disk is in drive B:. Otherwise use whatever drive letters are appropriate.)

Now, about that bind a lot of folks are in... Well, near the bottom of your DIR listing of the STARTER PAK, you'll find a file called SDCOPY.COM. This file was originally written by John Moore of Atlanta, on the theory that a large portion of the ADAM community has a single drive system. SDCOPY is a Single Drive COPY utility. And it's used like this:

#### SDCOPY CATPRTV1.4Z

SDCOPY will then guide you through the proper swapping of source and destination DDP's. One warning, though: Perform ALL of the swaps. Even if YDU KNOW that it has written the entire file, keep to the directions; otherwise, you say desage one or both of your media.

So, after some preparation, you now have a work medium that has CPMADAM.COM, CATPRIVI.4, and UNCR.20 on it... along with a whole lot of empty space. Fear not, we'll put that space to good use!

To start with, if you've been following this column, you'll remember that most files having a Z as the second letter of their file extension will be files that have been compressed using the CRUNCH method. Therefore, we need to extract the file into a useable foreat, like this:

UNCR20 A: CATPRTV1.4Z A: \*.\*

This will decompress CAT and put it into a readable format.

Great! We now have a wonderful EOS file that's readable in CP/M. Still doesn't do us a whole lot of good, but we're getting there.

CPMADAM.COM was one of those programs that COLECO, in one of their brief flashes of consumer-oriented thought, put together for the poor end user. COLECO realized that, as good as CP/M is, there would come a time when folks would want to swap files back and forth between CP/M and EOS. Thus CPMADAM.COM was born.

As the instructions for CPMADAM are listed in the manual, I'll only briefly touch on it. Type in CPMADAM (Return) and then follow the onscreen instructions, using your newly decompressed version of CATPRTV1.4 as the file to transfer.

The destination medium for CAT can be almost any EOS medium. (My immediate suggestion is the SmartBASIC tape itself, but some folks are a bit skittish about putting files on an "original DDP". Balderdash... there is very little that you can do to SmartBASIC to damage it, and this isn't it.)

OK. Everything appears okay, no error messages, no runs, no drips, no errors! Now why are we doing this again? Oh, yeah... because CATPRIVI.4 is one of the great undiscovered PD EDS programs of the decade. But what's it do? Well, I'm glad that you asked, and you're probably confused as to why I waited this long to explain it to you.

#### BIOS CALL, continued

Have you ever been looking for a particular program and KNOWN that it's on one of your disks or DDPs (motioning to a stack slightly smaller than TRUMP TOWER) but you're not exactly sure which one? Well, CAT will take care of that for you. CATPRTV1.4 is a small, easy -to-use catalog printer of both disks and DDPs in both EDS and CP/M. That's right; with just a few minutes of your time and a few sheets of paper, you can have a very comprehensive listing of ALL the files on each of your disks or DDPs, be they CP/M or EDS, as well as know exactly which medium they are on!!!


Operation couldn't be simpler. Load SmartBASIC, RUN CATPRTV1.4 and follow the onscreen directions. You select the drive to be cataloged and insert the medium. CAT reads the directory and prints out a listing as well as the title of the medium.

The only drawback to CAT is that I have been unable to get it to work with an external printer. It's my idea that this was written before the parallel printer was as common as it now is, so the option wasn't considered necessary. However, I am hoping someone will solve this. I will load up a disk or DDP, full of my favorite games, utilities, etc. and send it to the first EOS hacker that sends me a modified copy of CAT that works with a wide variety of external printers.

As to why I waited until the end to explain CAT to you... Well, if you'd known all along, then you might have skipped over a step or two, and... well... we can't have that. Besides, it was a good exercise in CP/M, eh?



This year's special Christmas BONUS! was provided by Ricki Gerlach. It is a full disk of HGR screens that can be used to make your own Christmas cards. It even contains greetings in German! On the disk are several graphics files turned upsidedown (for the front of the card) and text files turned right side up. When you print them, you can fold them so that they form a card with graphics on the front and text inside. (Actually, the text is in graphics format, too.) They are designed for use with either PomerPAINT or SwiftPrint. You can make changes in the upside-down files if you have both PowerPAINT and SwiftPrint (which has a Flip Picture feature.) Or you can change the wording around by using the Special Text option in PowerPAINT, and rotating it. (It takes some practice to put it just where you want it, but you that's what the UNDO key is for.)

Not everyone has a dot matrix printer, so we will have an alternate BONUS! If you prefer, you can choose the PD program EZMatch, courtesy of Rich Lefko.. This was originally printed in last month's NIBBLES AND BITS. It's a nice Concentration-type came in BASIC.

There's even a THIRD option for new members. If you have been with us less than two years, you might prefer the Christmas BONUS! we distributed in 1987. It consists of several Christmas programs in both BASIC and LOGO.

## THE NATIONAL SCENE =

TDOS: One of the most worrisome problems facing the ADAM community has been solved. We were all concerned about what would happen when we were no longer able to find Coleco CP/M, which has

n getting scarce. (M.W. Ruth and other retailers still have copies for sale, but the supply is limited.) CP/M is copyrighted by Digital Research. ADAM retailers have been working on the problem, and they have developed several strategies. However, Tony Morehen of Ontario has been working for a long time on an operating system he calls TDOS. At ADAMCON, Tony confirmed that TDOS will work with virtually all CP/M programs. From all reports, TDOS is an amazing piece of work. But what's REALLY amazing is that Tony is donating it to the public domain! We got a taste of TDOS operating in conjunction with Ron Collins' hard drive at ADAMCON. (The combination is enough to knock your socks off.) As with most ambitious projects, the documentation tends to be a sticky point. Rob Friedman reports that he is trying to help Tony write a very comprehensive set of docs, so that even people who are unfamiliar with CP/M can work with TDOS. Now, THAT'S a big project! But, it will be a real boom to all of us. 

the "discovery" of the graphics program that Coleco apparently used to draw their graphics. It was exciting to try and figure out how it worked, in the absence of any docs whatsoever. By trial and error, we discovered some of its features, but it certainly isn't "user-friendly". The colors, for example, are designated by numbers in hexadecimal. It looks as though the "Braphics Processor" is going to be treated as public domain by the major groups, since it was never sold.

What I forgot to mention is that the installation INCLUDES setting up the hard drive with software. This is an important point because so many of us do not know how to do that. BJ mays he will include the current revision of TDOS, EOS, and "a couple megs' worth of utilities." If you are not sure what parts you need, BJ suggests you contact Larry Overman. (Sorry, I still haven't found Larry's address.)
